

## More of Martín's travels!

In August last year, 2018 I visited a trio of delightful churches to the east of the Severn, in Worcestershire again all very contrasting.



St Peter's at Pirton is a Grade I listed building owing to significant Norman elements, and the wonderful 14 c wood timber framed N tower, which has had some restoration work carried out recently.

An Anglo-Saxon mass dial is over the north doorway. The east window, 1909 by W. Pearce Ltd of Birmingham, shows Christ with SS Peter and John. The chancel south window shows the Good Shepherd, probably by the same artist.

The nave was lengthened by taking down the central tower and the west tower arch, and building a new north-west tower, which has been dated to the late C14. Nave walls were rebuilt in 1882-83 by W.J. Hopkins, architect of Worcester.

The keystone bears an acrobat, standing on his hands with bent elbows and with splayed, downward-pointing legs. Above the S doorway is a corbel carved with a grinning human head with forked beard and centre-parted hair.

Amid nearby Croome Park, the church of Croome d'abitot is a modern reincarnation built in 1763 for the Coventry family, and is an attempt at Early Gothic revival externally with an interior of 'pure Georgian gothic' to match, with elegant Gothick windows and



plasterwork, pulpit, communion rails, commandments and creed boards.

The tracery used for instance is Y-cusped and intersectingcusped. Opulent monuments brought from the old church, long since demolished, show the former Barons and Earls of Coventry in their full glory. The earliest - in black and white marble - shows the 1st Lord, who died in 1639, reclining under a canopy. The monument to the 1st Earl, who died in 1699, is missing because the 2nd Earl disapproved of his father's second marriage, at an advanced age, to a servant, Elizabeth Graham.



His monument is now in the nearby church of St Mary's at Elmley Castle instead.

The church built by some of the finest craftsmen in England including Joseph Rose, John Hobcroft and Sefferin Alken was consecrated and dedicated to St Mary Magdalene in 1763.

It is cared for since 1975 by the Churches Conservation Trust. The bells if you can listen to them are also marvellous.

Nearer to the river we find St Denys at Severn Stoke In 1086, the land formed part of the manor of Pershore, which Edward the Confessor had given to Westminster Abbey. One priest is recorded at Severn Stoke in the Domesday Survey. It was held by Alvred, in 1166 by the



king, and in 1167-8 by Walter Beauchamp, who subsequently forfeited it, probably before 1170. Richard I gave Severn Stoke to Baldwin de Betun, Earl of Albemarle. The nave has one small Norman window high up and a Norman buttress. The big N tower was begun in c.1300. The S window's top roundel with a quatrefoil is a C13 motif. The chancel E window is early perpendicular.

The Reverend R. C. Toogood, has written a very good *Guide to St Denys Church, Severn Stoke*, (which I can recommend if you would like to appraise more the designs of this church).

#### **OBERAMMERGAU – JUNE 1970**


#### with St. Paul's Church, Methodists, Baptists and Salvation Army


Following the Palm Service, came the judging of Jesus and the Crucifixion, which was very moving, particularly at this point as we had a terrific storm running around the mountains.

## My road to Christ Church....



In 2002 I took up my dream job: Senior Conservator at Lambeth Palace Library.

I was working on the most amazing manuscripts dating from the 9<sup>th</sup> century, chronicling the history of the Church and State, in a wonderful grade one listed building which had been witness to and been part of those events. The 12<sup>th</sup> century crypt is an amazing place of solace. There were then several sisters from the Community of the Holy Name, Derby, who brought such love and comfort when it was needed. Under Archbishop Rowan Williams, we were all made to feel a part of his loving Christian family. I don't think I have ever met a man with such enormous love. Lambeth Palace was my spiritual home.

As with all things, change happens; and when Rowan Williams left, there were no more sisters and a complete turn-over of Palace staff and procedures followed. Whilst life in the Library was still pretty wonderful, for me the underlying love and mystery of the place seemed to have vanished. I began to think of retirement – a thought which filled me with dread.

I had always promised myself that I would retire to a home with a sea view; and knowing Worthing from my school days, thought I might do well to look there. In July of 2015, I found the perfect house with spectacular views. I sold my Pimlico flat and had my offer on the house accepted. Nine agonising months later, it was mine. It seemed too soon to retire, so for the next two years I commuted to Lambeth. With travel, I was notching up 13-hour days – often longer on Southern Rail strike days. I retired at Easter 2018.

I had tried a local parish church, in 2017. They were nice people, but the services lacked the formality and discipline I was used to, and I stopped going after a few months. I tried another; but it was not only a bit too far to travel (I only have a bike), but also a little painful with the memories of my now departed parents who had retired to this area.

The fantastic summer of 2018 saw me busy with my local bowls club (Treasurer and two wood singles Champion) but by the autumn the reality of being retired had struck home; I was feeling rather low. I had set up a small conservation studio in my house, but it was a lonely experience after Lambeth. I started thinking and reading about faith. I tried a Quaker meeting. Again, they were friendly people, who made me feel very welcome. The hour meeting was, however, in total silence; no one stood up to speak. Having fallen asleep during my second meeting, I decided that I needed more structure and guidance. Quakerism was not for me.

One day after Christmas, I felt the real need to attend a Book of Common Prayer Communion service. As with almost all sources of instant knowledge in today's world, my Googling 'BCP communion service Worthing' brought up the answer: Christ Church Worthing, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Thursday of the month. (It still works - I just checked it!) I went that first Thursday lunchtime and was warmly welcomed by such loving people. I've got to know them and other such wonderful folk at Christ Church. Every week I discover new friends and I really feel that I have come home. It's quite strange, but I used to dread the Peace at the first church I attended. It seemed like an eternally-long free for all embarrassment. I think Christ Church's is longer – but I love it! To be amongst such loving kindness, and to be addressed by name – I do feel as if I'm home.

So, thank you for making me feel so welcome. I know that God pointed me towards Christ Church and led me to your door, and that He has opened up a whole new world and family to me.

## <u>Claíre's Cake</u>

At Christmas Claire became very ill and was admitted to the Children's Ward in Worthing Hospital, she is only 6 years old and her family take turns in staying with her. On New Year's Eve Dana Dix, a Mothers' Union member and I went into the ward with the 3 home made cakes and cheese scones that Mothers' Union take in every Monday. This was the first time we met Claire and her Nana. She was not allowed any food and was on fluids only. Nana refused cake because Claire couldn't have any; but accepted a cuppa and a chat.

As each week went past Claire became a little stronger and every Monday afternoon we'd go into her room and Claire would look hopeful and in a small voice say, "Cake?". "No not yet," we'd say. Nana had given into temptation and would have coffee, cake and a chat. "I lose time and a sense of reality in here. I stay here all day until either her mum or dad comes in to do the night shift. You coming in on a Monday makes me remember that life hasn't stopped forever. In the real world people don't all wear uniforms, and we all will go back home and to normal life – whatever that is."

After 5 weeks Claire was allowed to have the butter cream icing from the middle of her nanas cake, the sheer delight on her face as she sucked the butter cream from the tip of the teaspoon brought tears to our eyes. Staff felt that by the following week she could have a tiny piece of cake with butter cream icing. We relayed this to our cake makers and it was agreed that they would make up a little more cake mix and make a single tiny butterfly cake filled with butter cream icing for Claire.

When we go in now, Claire asks, "My Cake??" She is getting stronger every day, and one Monday we will go onto the children's ward and find that Claire and Nana have gone home. There will be another child in her bed. Another family waiting and watching. Another opportunity for our members to show
