

Remembering a dear friend..

It is with great pleasure that I write a reflection on a man who was a past Churchwarden, and so much more, John Akerman. I had known John way before I joined Christ Church, ten years ago. He was a local solicitor and I was a civil servant, both of us used to represent clients at the local Magistrates' Court. For those who knew John, would



know that his voice was quite loud, in fact it would boom, especially if he saw you out and about. It was not a surprise for other folk to stop and turn around upon hearing the question 'young Hobbs, how are you?' or for me to be to be ordered quite unexpectedly, without prior preparation, whilst sitting in court waiting to present a case 'Hobbs, I need you as a witness, it will only take a few minutes!'

John was unique in so many ways, and in the six years that I observed him in church I really got to know just how lovingly he regarded his work as Churchwarden and how much he loved his Christ Church. I was truly guided by him. He knew before I did, that I would succeed him as warden, and when the time came, he quietly told me that he would nominate me.

John died late 2015, and I am reminded of him in many ways, particularly in his attention to detail.

I was so pleased when, during the interregnum, I received a sum of money from the Akerman family, to use freely for the work of Christ Church. I had a few ideas, but I thought that the porch needed some tender loving care, and it is, after all, the main entrance to the Church. So it was that plans were made to open the wooden panels into the doors with glass, so there was 'kerb appeal' for folk to see into Christ Church, from the pavement. With smart stewardship and a little help from the grants' system with reclaimed VAT, the church family were able to decorate and revitalise the porch, as it is today.

There is a discreet plaque on the panel, to the left, as you enter the Church in acknowledgement to whom, I feel, was an incredible gentleman.

Fraiche Fruit Fool

Ingredients:

1 tin fruit filling [e.g. summer fruits/black cherry]

1/2 pint /10 fluid ozs custard - cooled

2 tablespoons Double, thick cream

2 tablespoons Crème Fraiche

Method:

Useful hints....

To prevent pictures leaving a mark on wallpaper etc, stick a doublesided foam pad to the back of the picture at each corner, but do not remove the protective paper from the free edge, so that it keeps the picture from marking the wall. 

A recent visit to the National Memorial Arboretum to honour the 14 of our ship's company lost to enemy action in 1982, and those who have died since, emphasised the value of our close relationship not only with our shipmates but also families of the casualties. Our enduring support network was established at a time when many in the military medical profession denied the existence of Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder and

played a great part helping those affected continue a productive life. Returning home, I reviewed the photos I'd taken that day and felt an almost physical impact from three consecutive photos.



Following our annual act of remembrance at the bench dedicated to HMS Glamorgan I had appreciated the Easter Sunday sunshine walking down to an area of the Arboretum new to me.


Here was the intensely moving "Shot at Dawn" memorial, a statue of a young soldier, Private Herbert Burdon, secured to a post, blindfolded and with the buttons cut off his greatcoat.

. In front of him a line of six trees representing the firing squad and behind him posts representing the 308 others shot for cowardice.

I thought of the support we had generated amongst ourselves illustrated by our meeting together either at the NMA four years out of every five or every fifth year in Portsmouth Cathedral - but sorry for those of our number still unable to move on.



Slowly walking back from this poignant reminder, we came across another statue new to me – the Sapper Support Memorial. Visitors are invited hold the hand of the statue and "…reflect and remember those who have left us after battling with PTSD and other associated mental illnesses," the changes in official attitudes to PTSD from the Great War



where sufferers were liable to be shot, through the period up to and beyond the South Atlantic conflict when it was seen as "lack of moral fibre" up to today when such suffering is recognised and can be dealt with professionally and with compassion.
