# Concerned about someone sleeping rough?

Connecting people sleeping rough to local services

# On any given night in England and Wales, there are 2,700+ people sleeping on our streets. Sleeping rough is dangerous and extremely damaging to your health.

We know that many people would like to help when they see someone sleeping rough but don't know how. StreetLink offers a practical solution.

## How does StreetLink work?

StreetLink is a 24/7 website, mobile app and phone line, which allows you to send an alert about the location of someone sleeping rough. StreetLink will then pass this information to the relevant local services so they can try to find and connect them with support.

Our team will follow this up within ten days to see what action was taken and, if requested, give you an update on what happened as a result of your alert.

StreetLink does not provide accommodation and is not an emergency service; we simply help to make the connection between someone sleeping rough and the local services that can provide help.

### How do I get in touch?

There are three ways you can tell us about someone sleeping rough:

- Visit www.streetlink.org.uk, click 'Tell us about a rough sleeper' and fill in as many details as you can
- Download the mobile app (available for free from the iTunes and Google Play stores) and follow the same steps as the website
- Call 0300 500 0914.

### What information will I be asked for?

The more detail we get, the better the chance of the individual being found. Please provide the following information where possible:

- A specific location for the individual sleeping rough. You can do this by using the map to pinpoint the exact location if reporting via the website or mobile app.
- A description of the location with as much detail as possible, e.g. nearby shops or monuments.
- Details of the times of day that the individual is usually in the location.
- Any information about them i.e. name, gender, age, ethnicity and any other physical description.

#### **Recycling in Lancing**

This organisation is run entirely by volunteers who are

dedicated to recycling. Revenue made from that recycling is given to local charities.

Members of the public are invited to donate specific items which should not be put in the local authority recycling wheelie bins.

These items include: -

All brands and sizes of crisp packets plus a range of biscuit wrappers

All brands of toothpaste tubes (not pump tubes) toothbrushes, (manual and electric, plus the packaging they come in. (Cardboard goes into the ordinary bins)

All writing instruments (NOT wooden pencils or crayons) but anything else (pens, felt tips/markers/highlighters/glue sticks)

Trigger sprays from cleaning bottles. (Bottles into local council bins)

The tops from milk containers should not be put in our ordinary bins. (Barbara collects these at Christ Church, as does Recycling in Lancing!)

"Master, it must be hurting a lot! Why



#### Another of Barbara's Fascinating Lives...



#### Antonine de Saint-Exupery

author of The Little Prince (among other titles)

This Frenchman was born in June 1900. He was a writer, poet, aristocrat, journalist and pioneering aviator. His abiding interests as he grew up were aeroplanes and deserts. These two things were to play a huge part of his life and indeed his death.

I belatedly came across both the author's personal life and his very famous book 'The Little Prince" which is sometimes referred to as a children's book and at other times, a book for adults but written in the style

of a children's book. Perhaps one with a message for all ages.

Antonine flew planes in the early days of the development of flight, when very few people even thought of it. He took his first flight at the age of twelve. He was determined to fly and was not put off by the many mishaps he experienced. His flights eventually took him to South America (flying over the Andes) and Dakar in Senegal (flying and crashing in the desert) as well as Europe. He lived and worked in the Sahara Desert for a while. He wrote books to while away the time in between flights. He was conscripted into the French Air Force in 1921. By the time he was



40 years old, France was under occupation. He fled war torn Europe to America, where he stayed for two or three years. While living in New York he wrote and illustrated The Little Prince which was published in English several years before the French edition because of the restrictions of war and occupation.

Upon his return to Europe from America, he joined The Free French Airforce delivering mail and doing reconnaissance flights over the North African desert. On his ninth mission in July 1944, he left Corsica and was not seen again. More than five decades later, in 1998, a bracelet was found by a fisherman. That bracelet had Antonine's name, as well as that of his wife, engraved on it. A search was started for the plane. It took more than another decade to find sufficient evidence to establish the whereabouts of the lost plane. More amazingly, the German fighter pilot who shot down the plane was still alive in 2006. It is surely worth reporting that that pilot had spent time trying to disprove that he had been responsible for the death of Antonine as the author was a particular hero of his. Such are the things of war!

The Little Prince has been translated into over 300 languages. It has many wise sayings, among them: 'Language is the source of misunderstanding ' 'Grown Ups never understand anything for themselves, and it is tiresome for children to be always and forever explaining things to them'

There are programmes still available on BBC radio iplayer, as well as numerous YouTube videos about the author. His 100th birthday was commemorated with his picture on the 50franc note. The note was withdrawn in 2002 when France adopted the Euro.
