

Our parish also includes many nursing and care homes, as well as many people living alone.

We recognise that all parishes face particular difficulties:

We have recently come through a traumatic time with the arrest and subsequent imprisonment of our former vicar. For some of our members, this has left them feeling let down, especially those who placed their trust in him.

The church family is blessed with many willing retired clergy who have supported us, as we have each other. We are determined to see our church through to a brighter future that God has prepared for us, trusting fully in the Holy Spirit.

(Isaiah 40: 31 but those who hope in the LORD will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint.)

There are those in the church family who believe that nothing should change, and there are equally others who strive for change, so holding **all** the family will be a particular challenge facing any woman or man who joins us as our incumbent.

Like most parishes at this time, we face a diminishing income and this next year (2024) will be the first in many years when regrettably, we will be unable to meet our full ministry share. Whilst this will now be a House for Duty post, we very much hope and trust that as our parish grows, and our ministry increases, that God willing, this could change over the coming years.

So, what about Worthing?

Worthing is a large seaside town in West Sussex, within the historic County of Sussex, forming part of the Brighton, Worthing, Littlehampton conurbation. It is beautifully sandwiched between the South Downs National Park and the sea. 10 miles (16 km) west of Brighton, and 18 miles (29 km) east of the county town of Chichester. The borough covers an area of 12.5 square miles (32.37 km²) and has an estimated population of 113,000. It sits on a flat, coastal plain, enjoying a 'microclimate' of clement weather for the majority of the year. Several of our members swim in the sea, just a few minutes' walk from the vicarage, which sits approximately 150 yards from the church.



Modern Worthing has a large service industry, particularly in financial services. It has a large outstanding teaching hospital, a state-of-the-art gym facility and indoor swimming pool, bowling alley, three theatres and one of Britain's oldest cinemas all in or near the town centre. Writers Oscar Wilde and Harold Pinter lived and worked in the town.



There are also many hotels within the parish, which brings in visitors from around the world. We have fliers advertising our services etc to be delivered to them all.

Worthing's main civic centres, the Town Hall, Assembly Hall, Library and Magistrate's Court, all fall within the Parish boundary.



Worthing Central is still in the top 10% of most deprived areas in England. Worthing has more people living in flats than the average in the UK, and over

25% are one person pensioner households. Just under 90% are white British, 10% higher than the average in the UK, and 6% are non-white. Within the population in the parish 60% live alone, the majority living in private rented accommodation.

Within a mile of Christ Church, there are four Church of England churches, and three of other Christian denominations.

Historically, Worthing has been a popular retirement area, however, we are experiencing an upsurge of younger families, settling outside of the parish, in the Worthing area post-Covid.

Living in Worthing is great because...

What does our church offer?

We currently offer:

Holy Communion at 10.30 am [Common Worship] every 1st, 3rd and 5th weeks

Morning Prayer at 10.30 [Common Worship] every 2nd & 4th weeks

Congregation for morning services currently average around 45 – this has dropped in the past 6 months from around 50

BCP Evensong at 6pm every 1st and 3rd weeks: *average attendance 8*

10.30 am BCP shortened BCP Holy Communion every 2nd and 4th Thursdays:
Average attendance 11

Parishioners routinely read lessons and lead the intercessions at all services. We have one trained Minister of Communion, who assists at every Communion service, and one more who takes communion to a church family member who is housebound.

In the past 5 years, we have had 3 adult baptisms and 1 child baptism, 1 wedding in 2018 and another in 2024, and over 7 funerals.

We have two House Groups that study the Bible together, and there is a need for more.

There are several PCC committees empowered to make decisions for the PCC to ratify: The Worship Committee; Outreach Committee; Social Committee and Fabric Committee.

We are also alert to the need for a healthy culture to enable everyone to flourish.

What about the Church Building and activities within?

Christ Church has a closed burial ground and sits in the heart of the town, between Grafton Road and Portland Road, built in the gothic revival style. Christ Church was built by subscription between 1840 and 1843. It is Worthing's most conspicuous flint building and still retains the original cobbled flint wall surrounding the church yard. The present organ was installed in 1970, made in 1892 by J.J. Binns of Leeds, and was purchased from a Methodist Church in Rochdale, an excellent three-manual instrument.

Christ Church began a fully costed 10-year plan of reordering in 2014. We have already installed a suite of modern toilets, with disabled and baby changing facilities, with wheelchair access and self-opening doors to the North side. There is also a fully fitted, commercial modern kitchen used for church events and groups. The PCC had new boilers fitted in 2016, and so now has an efficient heating system.

The doors leading into the church are now infilled with glass to welcome everyone in.

In 2021, the PCC obtained a faculty to remove some pews from the west end of the church, creating a much-needed space for community activities, welcoming visitors and parishioners,



serving coffee and tea, as well as a knit and natter club and fund-raising activities and is consistently 'manned' by our parishioners two mornings and one afternoon a week, and every Sunday after services. The hall has a fully equipped servery, and is fitted throughout with stunning oak, able to accommodate 50 people seated and 120 standing.

There is also an additional upright piano for entertaining in the hall space, and a successful small, free library, where books are loaned, donated and bought for a small donation. There are various meeting rooms, where

local Alcoholics Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous and Cocaine Anonymous groups meet weekly, and also where church committees and groups assemble. The building and roof is sound for its age. The last Quinquennial in 2019 reported no urgent category 1 issues to be addressed.

There are modern computers and office space, which also is home to the choir on Sundays. Our office has a modern photocopier that produces black and white or colour booklets for every service weekly.

Currently, the nursery across the road from the church use our building to hold their annual graduation ceremonies, their Christmas Carol Concerts and all other celebrations. They take part in our Christmas Tree Festival and sing Christmas songs to the church family in the first week of December. There is an opportunity for much more outreach with them, with the help of our new incumbent. *(In a recent email from them, the manager said “we have been very excited to get a partnership going with you and the children loved the church at graduation!”)*

There has long been a desire to promote our beautiful church offering small weddings and receptions for couples who find it hard to afford the cost of hotel ‘package weddings’ or a church wedding and hotel venue reception and who would love to marry in the presence of God.

We have hosted monthly high-quality concerts in the church from April to November, with regular attendees from outside the church family. Our calendar of social events for church members and visitors alike is advertised on our website.

As a congregation, all the missions we support have a particular link to members of the church; we support Mission to Seafarers, Care for Veterans, Mothers’ Union with the Diocesan Family Support Work, the Worthing Food Bank and the Christ Church Discretionary Fund.

Some members of the church visit local care and nursing homes to offer haircuts/styling, and to sing.

We print all the service sheets for our neighbouring church, we pray for each other and occasionally support each other’s social events.

As the town centre church, many of our regular visitors drop into Christ Church for company, for advice and very often just for a listening ear. Many have now joined us and some are yet to join us in worship. Sometimes, homeless folk

meet in the church yard, where members of the congregation will chat and offer a hot drink.

We see this as vital work for God - *"Whenever you do this for the least of your brothers, you do this for me"*.

Finally, the Vicarage.....



The Vicarage at 5, Christchurch Road Worthing, BN11 1JH is situated on the south corner of Abbotts Close and Christchurch Road, opposite to the newly built Central Medical Centre within several yards of Christ Church and has been refurbished and expanded to meet Incumbent status. The property is a three-bedroom unfurnished house with separate, downstairs WC, second bathroom, two reception rooms, study, garage and garden, in good decorative order. We also have good junior and senior schools locally, though there are none in the parish.

And finally.....

*We asked the clergy who minister regularly at Christ Church how they see us.
This is what they said....*

“As a retired member of the clergy it has been my privilege, and pleasure, to conduct services (viz Holy Communion & Morning Prayer) at Christ Church Worthing on a reasonably regular basis. Christ Church might reasonably be described as a 'Middle of the Road' Anglican Church. There is a choir of some 5/6 ladies and two gentlemen who attend and contribute - wearing Choir Dress – to the regular Sunday Services. This compliments the role of the Organist and the input of the congregation in supplementing the musical/singing enhancement of the services.

The congregation are further encouraged to participate in regular involvement through contributions of reading lessons and intercessory prayer.
